

It's likely safe to say that most Canadian houses have a poinsettia on display during the Christmas season. It turns out there are multiple links between the pretty plant and Christmas.

Cuetlaxochitl (Euphorbia pulcherrima) is native to southern Mexico, where the Aztecs used it for millennia to produce red and purple dyes as well as medicines. The shrub responds to the lengthening nights after the autumn equinox by preparing its leaf bracts to turn colour. It is its nature to bloom in December. The flower is actually that little yellow circle in the middle of the "bloom".

The timing of the annual bloom for wild cuetlaxochitl began the plant's association with the Christmas season during the 16th century, when missionaries spread the Catholic faith through the indigenous communities of Mexico.

There is an old Mexican legend about how Poinsettias and Christmas come together: There was once a poor Mexican girl called Pepita who had no present to give the baby Jesus at the Christmas Eve Services. As Pepita walked to the chapel, sadly, her cousin Pedro tried to cheer her up.

"I'm sure that even the smallest gift, given by someone who loves him will make Jesus Happy."

Pepita didn't know what she could give, so she picked a handful of weeds from the roadside and made them into a small bouquet. She felt embarrassed because she could only give this small present to Jesus. As she walked through the chapel to the altar, she remembered what Pedro had said. She began to feel better, knelt down and put the bouquet at the bottom of the nativity scene. Suddenly, the bouquet of weeds burst into bright red flowers, and everyone who saw them were sure they had seen a miracle. From that day on, the bright red flowers were known as the 'Flores de Noche Buena', or 'Flowers of the Holy Night'. The shape of the poinsettia flower and leaves are sometimes thought as a symbol of the Star of Bethlehem which led the Wise Men to Jesus. The red colored leaves symbolize the blood of Christ. The white leaves represent his purity.

Cultivation in the US began when diplomat Joel Roberts Poinsett (origin of the plant's common name) sent some of the plants back to his greenhouses in South Carolina in the 1820s. They were originally sold as cut flowers.

The plant's popularity boomed in the 1900's after North American growers bred and grafted the lanky roadside shrub to produce a more compact product suitable for potted sales. Further development with phytoplasma bacteria in the 1990's enhanced bract production to yield the bushy plants we now know.

The poinsettia is the world's most economically important potted plant. Each year in the US, approximately 70 million poinsettias are sold in a period of six weeks, at a value of US\$250 million.

Welcome Yarrow Water Users as we continue celebrating our 80th anniversary this year.

Our 80th AGM was held on May 16 and Ron Wedel & Gord Borne were both reelected as trustees and have begun their 2nd terms. Congratulations & thanks to

both Ron & Gord for putting their names forward to continue to help run our community water system. We had no water supply issues this summer as we didn't have to deal with any heat dome type weather. With the atmospheric river weather and higher Vedder River levels & flows in late October, we increased our disinfection dosage & our water quality sampling schedule to ensure our water distribution system stays coliform free. We have had to spend a lot of time collecting overdue water bills with an unusually high number of outstanding accounts in 2024. There were 115 bills outstanding on Oct.25 when the Sept.30 billing was due. On Friday, Nov.8, we mailed out Past Due notices to 81 accounts. Any unpaid accounts will be followed up with 24 Hour Turn Off notices within the next couple of weeks.

We'll be reviewing our Toll Bylaw to review any tolls remaining after said shall have added thereto a percentage an addition of twelve percent (12%) thereof. We need to increase the penalty to recover costs related to collecting late payments.

Please remember to winterize your outside taps & yard hydrants soon as Jack Frost will soon be here.

When I was a kid our family of 6 always drove the 50 miles to spend Christmas Eve at my maternal grandmother's tiny two bedroom house. No idea if our car had a radio. We always sang hymns & carols for the entire trip.

Aunt Bess, Uncle Mac and the 4 cousins arrived from Toronto about the same time we did. Out of parental earshot we would reminiscence about the summer's forbidden foraging trips to the dump, street fights with the Haney Gang & the time we launched Kevin down the river on a raft we had made. We only did that once.

Us older 5 slept (when we did manage to sleep) sideways on the double bed in Tony's Room. Tony was a farm-boy high school student who boarded with Gramma. Ontario had no school buses in the 1950's. The youngest 3 shared a wrought iron crib that

no doubt had cradled our mothers. I missed the chance to ask and will always wonder where the adults slept. Such details weren't important at the time.

Gramma didn't have a fireplace so we safety-pinned our stockings to the back of "the green chair". We didn't have a fireplace either. Actually, I can't think of anyone who did. Maybe they're a new invention?

It was always still pitch dark when us kids began stirring in the "morning". Anticipation is a powerful drug. By some stroke of fate, Santa always arrived about the time we all woke up. We were cautioned to stay upstairs but we could hear him ho-ho-hoing in the living room and banging stuff around as he filled the stockings. We were allowed to leave the bedroom once he was gone. We were so awe-struck it never occurred to us to venture down the stairs early.

This would probably be 5am. Gramma would be firing up the wood stove to get the turkey on in time for noon. Yep, both Grammas had wood stoves. This one had hydro and running (cold only) water. Gramma Bell on the farm had neither.

While the turkey cooked we headed off to the riverbank hill with the fathers. Another mystery is how the family toboggan somehow got there. Maybe it had been lashed to the roof of the car.

After turkey we drove to the farm for more visiting and roast goose. I always hoped it was the terrifying gander that made each trip to the barn a race for my life.

I have no memories of the trip home. We likely collapsed like a litter of played-out puppies and were carried to the car.
